John Comerford, Otterbein University

(Wednesday, Board of Education Forum)

Dr. John Comerford is the president of Otterbein University and a vocal advocate for access, affordability, and innovation in higher education. Under his leadership, Otterbein established a scholarship that covers full tuition for Ohio students from families with financial need; created a fund to invest in crowdsourced ideas from the University community that would immediately grow enrollment or revenue; and designed a four-year

career and professional preparation curriculum guided by trained advisors and mentors so Otterbein graduates are workforce-ready.

Comerford also serves as president of the Coalition for the Common Good – a higher education system of private, independent nonprofit colleges and universities founded by Otterbein and Antioch universities to improve equity in education through expanding graduate programs, workforce development, and degree completion. He is a board member of the Columbus Council on World Affairs, Delaware County Finance Authority, Educational & Institutional Insurance Administrators, Inc., Association of Independent Colleges & Universities of Ohio, and Ohio Foundation of Independent Colleges.

Our City and Schools

Westerville City Council consists of seven at-large members elected to four-year overlapping terms in non-partisan elections. Municipal elections are held in odd-numbered years, with four seats filled in one election and three seats filled in the next election. Westerville City Council represents the residents of the City and are the only elected officials, according to the City Charter. As Westerville's legislative body, City Council sets policy, establishes goals, and approves and oversees the City's annual budget. The City Manager manages the day-to-day Westerville operations and reports to City Council. Westerville's phenomenal residential and corporate growth has been comfortably balanced within this form of government. ***This year, City Council has nine (9) candidates running for four (4) open seats.***

The **Westerville City Schools Board of Education** endeavors to provide all students maximum educational opportunities within the constraints of available facilities, financial resources, legal requirements, and citizen involvement. It is the Board's responsibility to encourage the development of each student's ability to contribute in a democratic, free enterprise, and technological society. ***This year, the Board of Education has five (5) candidates running for three (3) open seats.***
